#### ***Still Life* by Sarah Winman (L, 11/2)**


An English soldier's chance encounter with a woman in WWII Italy leads him back to Tuscany

This historical epic set in early 20<sup>th</sup> century Korea follows a girl working for a courtesan and the unforgettable path she takes




#### ***Our Country Friends* by Gary Shteyngart (L, 11/2)**
