***Violeta* by Isabel Allende (1/25)**


A sweeping multigenerational narrative about a wealthy South American family

***Thank You, Mr. Nixon: Stories* by Gish Jen (1/25)**


A witty, incisive short story collection spanning the last 50 years of US-China relations through the eyes of ordinary Chinese people

***The Defense Lawyer: the Barry Slotnick Story* by James Patterson (L, 12/20)**

The mystery writer chronicles the (in)famous defense lawyer who defended John Gotti and the Subway Shooter among others



***South to America* by Imani Perry (1/25)**

Part memoir and part history, Perry complicates the popular image of the southern United States

***Chasing History: A Kid in the Newsroom* by Carl Bernstein (1/11)**

Bernstein's candid, exhilarating memoir details his early days in journalism as a teenager in Washington, D.C.

***George V: Never a Dull Moment* by Jane Ridley (1/4)**

An accessible, intimate view of the overlooked English king and grandfather of Queen Elizabeth II

***Seven Games: a Human History* by Oliver Roeder (1/25)**

The histories of checkers, backgammon, chess, go, poker, Scrabble, and bridge are profiled

***Worn: A People's History of Clothing* by Sofi Thanhauser (1/25)**
