*Star of the North* by D.B. John

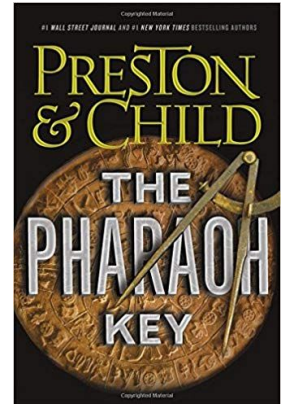
A well-researched and timely thriller set in 2010, focused on a kidnapping in North Korea
