Four retired assassins are targeted by their organization and must work together to survive

***Dreamland* by Nicholas Sparks (9/20)**


An unsuccessful musician meets and falls in love with an upcoming Nashville singer

***The Two Lives of Sara* by Catherine Adel West (9/27)**

Sara, a Black single mother in 1960s Tennessee, must deal with the fallout of her boss's secrets

The conclusion to the *Beartown* series finds two rival small towns at odds and a teenage boy seeking vengeance for his sister's death

Provocative historical fiction novel about Duchess Lucrezia de Medici's entrance into a dangerous Italian court
